We continue this week with a new episode of our series on cycling to work and share with you the stories of people who have been involved in commuting accidents.

## **Testimonies**

I was cycling along a small road one morning on an unseparated roadside cycle path. It was daylight, clear and sunny, a beautiful summer morning.

I came to a roundabout and left the cycle path to cross the roundabout. I saw a vehicle coming at me from the right at a high speed for the place, but it was too late, it didn't see me and hit me head on on the right side. I bounced off the bonnet breaking the windscreen with my head, luckily I was wearing a helmet, and landed on the road breaking seven ribs and my left collarbone.

I heard the tyres screeching as the vehicle started up and hit me just as a motorist came up to me and asked what had happened and I pointed out the vehicle that was trying to get away, she followed it which forced the driver to stop and come to my rescue.

It is now the end of September and I still have several weeks to recover before I can resume a normal life

I was returning from a road bike ride with friends at about 12:00 on the cycle track / shared space between pedestrians and cyclists 500 metres from my house.

Some inconsiderate tourists (on holiday) were walking around and blocked the last bollard for me while I was travelling at 20 km/h. It stopped me dead in my tracks.

I dove head first into it, the bike went over me. I don't remember anything. My face was bloody, glasses broken, helmet cracked in front, upper lip cut, 3 teeth broken, left shoulder painful (spine displaced), little finger on my right hand broken.


9 months later, still in care, but alive, I'm cycling again. In conclusion: helmets are not compulsory for adults, but they saved my life.
